



Disaster Lifecycle: **Emotional** Lifecycle



Appendix A

Communication Methods

ex 1: TECHNOLOGY TOOLS

Technology ranging from simple to sophisticated systems can provide rapid, efficient, low-cost, 2-way communications with groups of individuals.

Evaluate options well in advance of an emergency. Routinely test the system you select with a small group of members.

Consider employing the system for routine, non-emergency usage, such as communicating with vestry or bishop's committee members, so that you are ready to quickly activate your system when the need arises.

Technology offerings are plentiful, and most provide texting and phone calling features. Here are just a few products:

- Dial My Calls

Prepare the Congregation

Know your WHYs

Prepare the Congregation

Cultivate preparedness buy-in and mindset via:

- ★ Vestry/bishop's committee onboarding
- ★ Facilitated workshop
 - NOT a 1-size-fits-all approach
 - NOT an assessment
 - Begins with congregation's strengths
 - Can include family prep
 - We discuss in advance what to cover
 - Will be fun. Will provide food.
 - Will provide \$1000 min. grant for outreach prep supplies. ► Offer expires Ash Wednesday

Diocesan Preparedness Protocol

- ★ Emergency Communications Leadership Team
 - Includes all bishops and all departments
- ★ AlertMedia for rapid HOC text check-in
- ★ Inter-diocesan storm watch & support facilitated by Episcopal Relief & Development

Case Study

Hurricane Preparedness Kits

St. Mark's, Beaumont

Tracie Middleton, Deacon James Pevehouse, Rector

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Planning / Procurement

A lay leader, Charles Teel, participates in community organizations such as CERT and Gulf SAR (Search and Rescue), and he took leadership of this project.

Charles researched what's important for kits on Ready.gov and customized them for our area in consultation with other members of Gulf SAR.

To increase the impact of the program, the strategy was to create a "starter kit" with recommendations for each family to add more items to complete the kit.

Items in starter kit:

- Flashlight
- Extra batteries
- First Aid Kit
- Whistle
- Dust masks
- disinfectant wipes
- Trash bags
- Large ziploc bag (for documents)
- Manual can opener
- Gas valve shutoff tool

Assembly

2 assembly sessions to put the kits together, since not all the supplies arrived at the same time.

Tables set up in a U shape. Volunteers and staff circled the table to assemble each kit.

Very efficient!



Distribution

At St. Mark's:

2 presentations in the gym, where each participant received a kit. The presentation was recorded to share virtually.

A lay member involved in disaster work shared information about items in the kit, as well as additional items to complete the kit based on each family's needs.

In Beaumont

A couple of organizations in Beaumont also received some kits for their clients:

- Catholic Charities Participants in a cohort of a new homeowner program received kits and viewed the virtual presentation as part of their program.
- Elijah's Place grief support for families that have lost a parent or child.

Covocational Churches

Members and clergy of some convocational churches came to pick up kits to distribute through their own channels:

- St. John's, Silsbee
- Trinity, Anahuac
- Holy Trinity, Jasper
- St. Pau's, Orange






A member of St. Mark's DOK, Lisa Brown, was inspired by the hurricane kit project. She felt that a different kind of kit would be more appropriate for students, especially international students, who may be unfamiliar with hurricane preparedness.

She advocated for the school to purchase supplies for hurricane kits for international students.

She invited the DOK helped to assemble the kits.

2023 Disaster Preparedness Outreach Grant



"Preparedness" for this grant means preparing for disasters caused by weather events which destabilize already vulnerable individuals and families.

2023 Disaster Preparedness Outreach Grant

Beneficiaries:

The program is to benefit low income persons.

Additional vulnerabilities include non-English speaking or ESL families, those with vulnerable immigration status, seniors, single-parent-households, unhoused persons, multi-generational households, those with disabilities, and other circumstances that make storm recovery especially difficult.

2023 Disaster Preparedness Outreach Grant

- √ This grant is to purchase supplies in advance of the next disruptive weather event.

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An ounce of **preparedness** is worth a pound of **resilience**.

When disaster arrives:

- ★ Good communication is oxygen
 - Staff, membership, community leaders, faith communities, government, highly vulnerable persons
- ★ Disaster rescue & relief are NOT well-oiled machines
 - Takes time for processing agencies to arrive
- ★ Who's in charge? Where are the grownups?
 - Faith-based communities expected to lead.
 - FBCs often considered more trustworthy than agencies.
 - We have more gifts to offer than we realize, even if we are inexperienced and/or significantly impacted.

If you are at the epicenter of a disaster:

"Help" will be offered from all around.


- Find someone to field offers of assistance.
- This should be someone who easily says NO THANK YOU.

Direct calls away from <u>your</u> cell phone Make it easy to give online to your congreg

Self-awareness is vital.

- ★ Operate out of your strengths.
- ★ Pay attention to your limits.
- ★ Ask for help. Be very specific in your ask.
- ★ Ask even busy colleagues for help. It's just for a short time. Be specific or you may get what you don't need.

"Disaster relief donations that don't bring relief"



Disaster relief & recovery

If you are **not** are at the epicenter of a disaster, the urge to jump into helpful action is strong, however:

- ★ Timing matters. Wait.
- ★ Encourage donations to ____.
- ★ Give only what's specifically requested.
- ★ Cash is always the most helpful gift.


